#### Chairperson's Report

2021 was a very interesting year for us, entering into another year of the COVID-19 global pandemic highlighted the importance of connection, family, friends, and mother nature. The B.L.T. Rails to Trails saw a significant increase in trail-usage; we all should be proud of a trail system that supports everyone in the community by keeping them healthy in both body and mind.

We launched a brand new web-site, which has become our landing pad. It is here that you can apply for membership, learn about the trail, report an incident, and keep current in trail news. As we enter a second year, we look forward to expanding our website to include more information.

We began a rebranding project in partnership with Trans Canada Trails. In 2021, the B.L.T. Rails to Trails officially joined the Western Loop of the Trans Canada Trail, and we also reaffirmed our partnership with Bike Nova Scotia, Nova Scotia Trails Federation, the ATV Association of Nova Scotia, and the Blue Route Trail System. This rebranding project included updating signage to include the communities of Beechville and Lakeside, display imaging that is reflective of our community, allow easier access to our website and most importantly acknowledge that the B.L.T. Rails to Trails is located on Mi'kma'ki.

Honouring our commitment at the 2020 AGM, we righted a wrong. Since the beginning of the trail system, the trailhead located on Lakeside Park Drive, has been named the "Lakeside Trailhead." Our board members worked with the Beechville Community Development Association and righted this wrong. In late 2021, we placed signage to educate all trail users that the B.L.T. Rails to Trails actually starts in the historical African Nova Scotian community of Beechville.

With our funding partners, we did significant trail maintenance this year. We re-graded from Cranberry Lake to Hubley and did vegetation management from KM 4 to Five Islands Bridge. We are currently in the process of working with funding partners to complete more trail maintenance in 2022. In late 2021, we received a report of a serious injury that was caused due to erosion at the Rails to Trails intersection at St. Margaret's Bay Road in Hubley. Joining forces with St. Margaret's Bay Rails to Trails Association and Safety Minded ATV Association, we installed an apron on both sides of the highway. This project was partially funded by the ATV Association of Nova Scotia.

Due to COVID-19, we had to cancel our International Trails Day and Canada Day celebrations. However, we honoured some lifelong volunteers with plaques and reflected on our country's horrible dark past. We did celebrate International Trails Day with a private trail blessing by a

Mi'kmaq Elder and did a virtual International Trail Day celebration by giving away prizes courtesy of Coca-Cola Canada.

We developed a new partnership with Coca-Cola Canada. This year they helped us purchase trail equipment, donated prizes for International Trails Day, and are helping us modernise our waste management system. In the next few months, Trail Crew Volunteers will be installing a small sticker on each garbage can which will have a QR code. When a garbage can is full, the trail-user can scan the QR code, and the automated system will send a notification to our trail volunteers. This system has been donated by Coca-Cola Canada and developed by our web-designer EM Space Creative.

Thanks to our friends at St. Margaret's Bay Rails to Trails, we trained several new volunteers as "Trail Ambassadors." We hope to expand this program in 2022 and incorporate it with our Summer Students - more details to come this year!

We have always replied on the support of the Bay Treasure Chest! We would like to thank them for their continuous support! We would also like to thank Trans Canada Trail, Nova Scotia Department of Community, Cultures, and Heritage, Halifax Regional Municipality, St. Margaret's Bay Rails to Trails, Safety Minded ATV Association, and ATV Association of Nova Scotia.

Finally, we both would like to thank our dedicated volunteers and board members. This year we learned a lot and we had many hours of growing pains, development, and learning. None of this would be possible without our dedicated volunteers and board members.

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## **Independent Practitioners' Review Engagement Report**

## NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2021 (Unaudited)

#### 1. Nature of operations

B.L.T. Rails to Trails Association (the "Association") provides development and maintenance of a multi-use trails and is exempt from income taxes under Section 149(1)(L) of the Income Tax Act.

#### 2. Significant accounting policies

The Association has applied the following significant accounting policies:

#### (a) Basis of presentation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

#### (b) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consists of cash on hand and balances with financial institutions.

#### (c) Financial instruments

The Association initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value, adjusted by the amount of transaction costs directly attributable to the instrument. The Association subsequently measures all of its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost. Transaction costs are amortized on the straight line basis over the term of the instrument.

#### (d) Bridge and equipment

Bridge and equipment are accounted for at cost and amortized using the straight-line method, at rates based on the estimated useful life of the assets, as indicated in note 3. Amortization is calculated at one-half the annual rate in the year of acquisition. No amortization is recorded in the year of disposal.

#### (e) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### (f) Revenue recognition

Grant revenue is recognized as revenue in the period in which the related expense is incurred based on the individual grant agreements. Grants received for the purchase of capital assets are deferred and recognized into revenue on a basis consistent with the capital assets' amortization charge. Other revenues are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

#### (g) Contributed services

Contributed services are not recognized in these financial statements because of the difficulty of determining the fair value.

#### 4. Financial instruments

The following are the significant risks that the Association is exposed to through its financial instruments:

#### (a) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. The Association's main credit risks relate to its accounts receivable. As the Association's receivables are from grantors and government agencies the risk is not significant.

#### (b) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association will encounter difficulty in meeting its obligations associated with its financial liabilities as they become due. The Association mitigates this risk by assessing future cash flow from grantors to ensure that it has sufficient cash to fulfill its obligations.

#### 5. Restatement of comparative figures/change in accounting policy

The comparative figures have been restated to account for a change in the accounting policy for the amortization of bridge and equipment, as well as to correct the recognition of funding in prior periods. Previously, the Association did not amortize it's capital assets. During the current year the Association adopted the policy as detailed in note 2(e). This change has been accounted for retrospectively. The effect of these restatements was an decrease in total assets of \$7,979, an increase in deferred revenue of \$10,182, an increase to deferred capital grants of \$9,844, and a reduction to the 2020 surplus of \$22,517.

#### 6. Comparative figures

In some cases, the comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with the current year's presentation.
